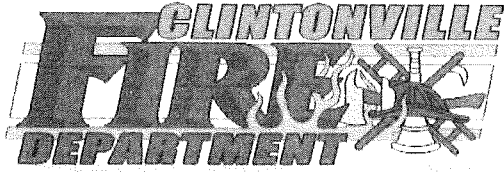

RE: March 2026 monthly report

- The weather in the last month has kept us busy. The snowstorm from March 14th to 16th presented many challenges for all of us in the city departments. It's very difficult to summarize those few days in a memo. Our dispatchers and officers did an outstanding job over the past few days. Officers brought their own shovels or bought shovels so they would have them in their squads to assist stranded motorists. Officers assisted many individuals who chose to drive and ultimately got stuck in the middle of the streets. Officers would push their shovels out of vehicles. One staff member slept in an office at the police department for three days to ensure he could make it to work, as they didn't believe he would make it home or be able to get back into work. Officers assisted EMS and Fire staff on calls with shoveling paths to residents. To assist the street department with removing snow, we closed off Main St. so they could easily clear snow from downtown during the busy period. This allowed them to get the snow removed quickly. All departments worked very well together. Our dispatchers would call our street department and advise them of an EMS or Fire call, and the streets department would clear out the area for emergency vehicles. Clintonville Area Ambulance went above and beyond by providing a ride for a mother and her children from their residence due to natural gas concerns. Our street departments did an outstanding job given the circumstances. Our Fire Department was stationed in town, ready to respond to any call and ensure sufficient staff was available. Our local towing companies responded quickly whenever we called. We are very fortunate to have reputable, professional towing companies in our area. I can't say enough about our staff at the police department and the city for working together to ensure our city remains open.
- A few weeks later, we were faced with more challenging weather. On April 2nd, we were faced with a severe ice storm and high winds. Due to the number of calls we were receiving at the police department, we called in a second dispatcher to handle phone calls and dispatching. In three hours, our department received 121 phone calls, and the second line we estimated took an additional 50-60 calls. We had our own challenges within the department due to power outages. Our radio repeater channel is located atop Aster and was without power; it has no generator. That prevented us from using our primary communication channel. Our dispatchers were rock stars during this event. Not only answering a large volume of calls, but also dispatching various departments to respond to several incidents at the same time. The amount of coordination between city departments was quite impressive. Many departments at different times have stepped

up and done suits they are not generally responsible for. In emergencies, departmental and staff titles are irrelevant; everyone worked well, and you should be proud of everyone.

- As I reported in previous months, now that spring is here, we are doing more proactive ordinance enforcement. Our goal is to get compliance and work with property owners to get their properties clean. If we can't get voluntary compliance, a municipal citation is issued. Our officers do their best to keep up with these types of things; however, we encourage residents with concerns to call the police department so we can bring them to our attention.
- With our Community Policing fund, we purchased 500 beach balls with our logo on them. We will be handing them over to the aqua park so they can hand them out to kids who use the aqua park for free. It's a small gesture we wanted to make, since Park and Rec employee Michele Herter has assisted our agency over the last few years by allowing us to use their Rec Desk program.
- We completed the first round of Captain Interviews on April 7th. I am grateful to the four police chiefs who sat on an external panel. I hope to have a decision made soon, and I will be going to PFC for approval next month.

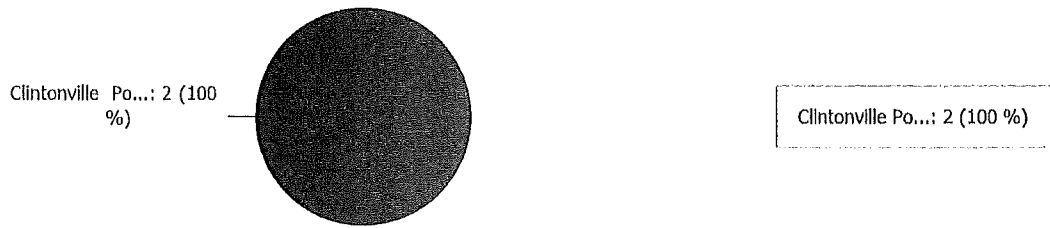

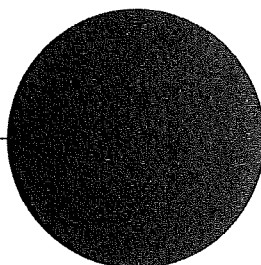


Demographic Data: Arrests

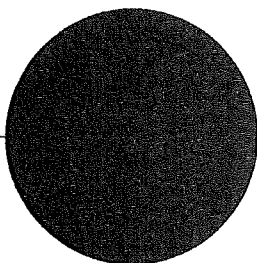

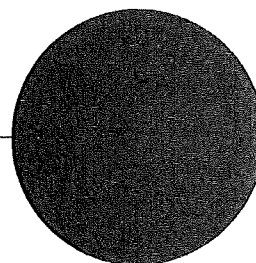

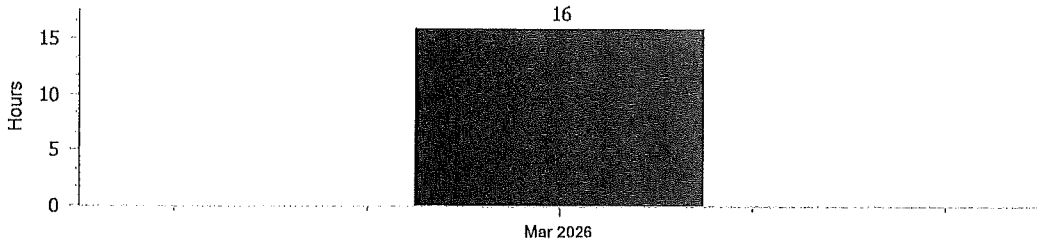
Training By Day Of Week

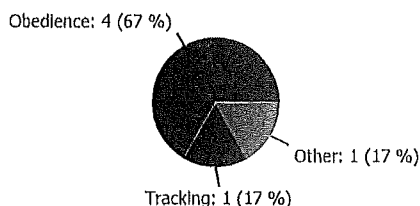

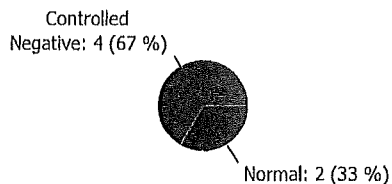


Patrol Exercise Types

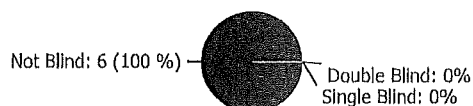

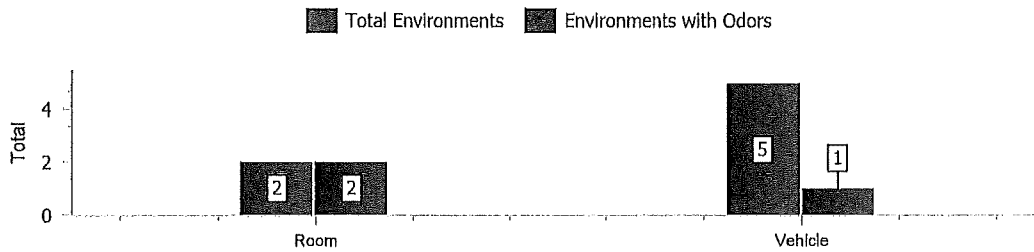

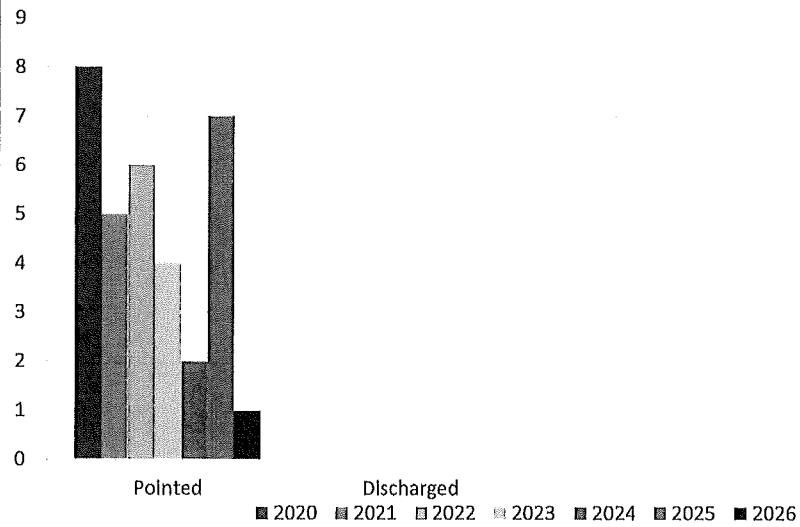
2026 Use of force report



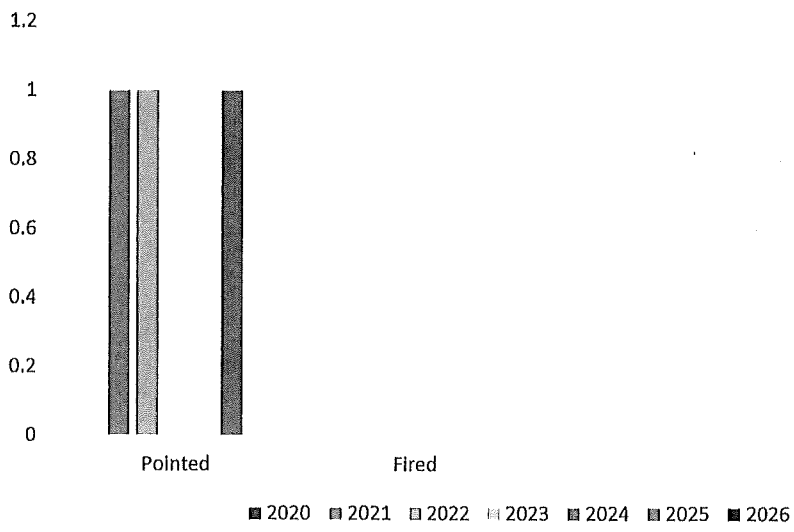
Comparison of techniques and/or tools used



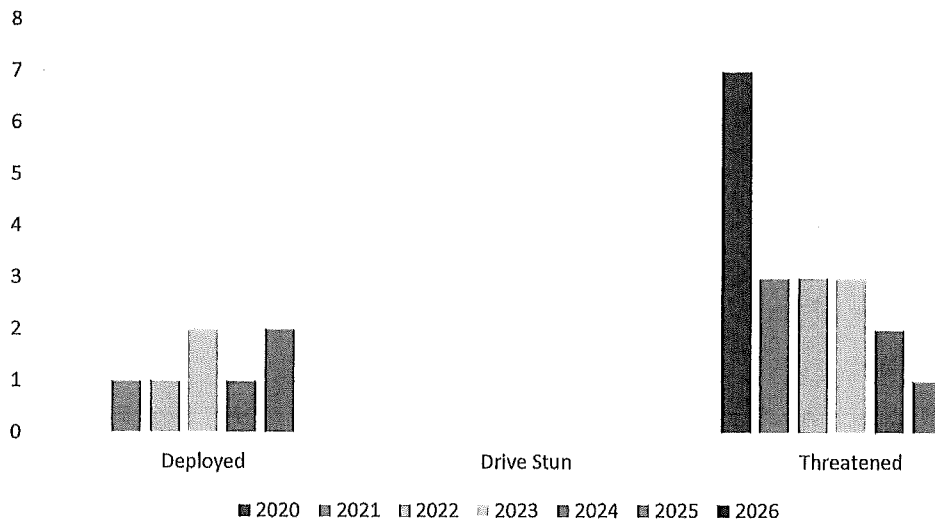

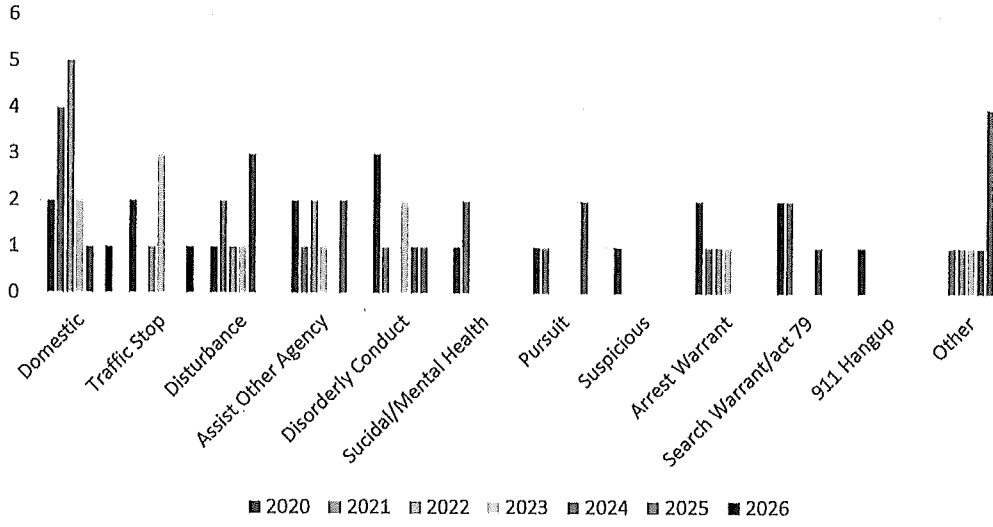
Kinetic Bean Bag



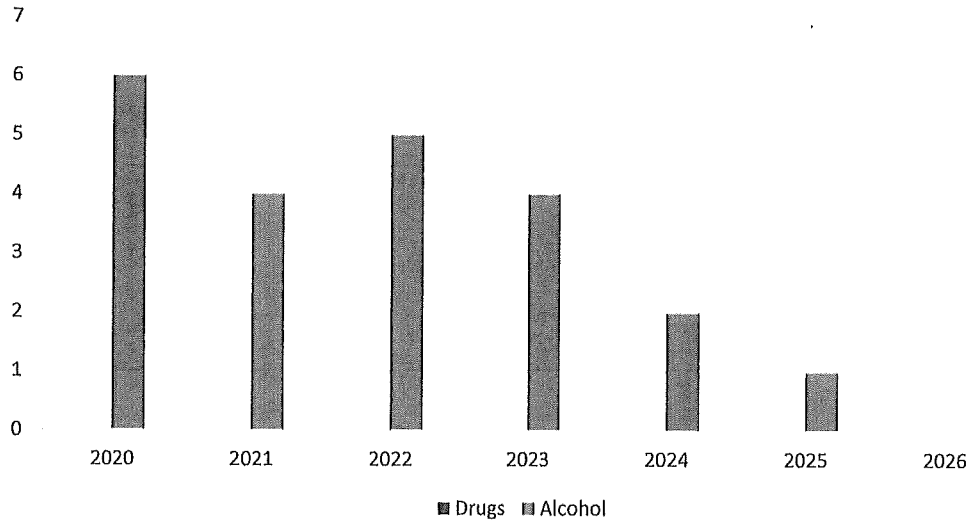
Taser Deployment



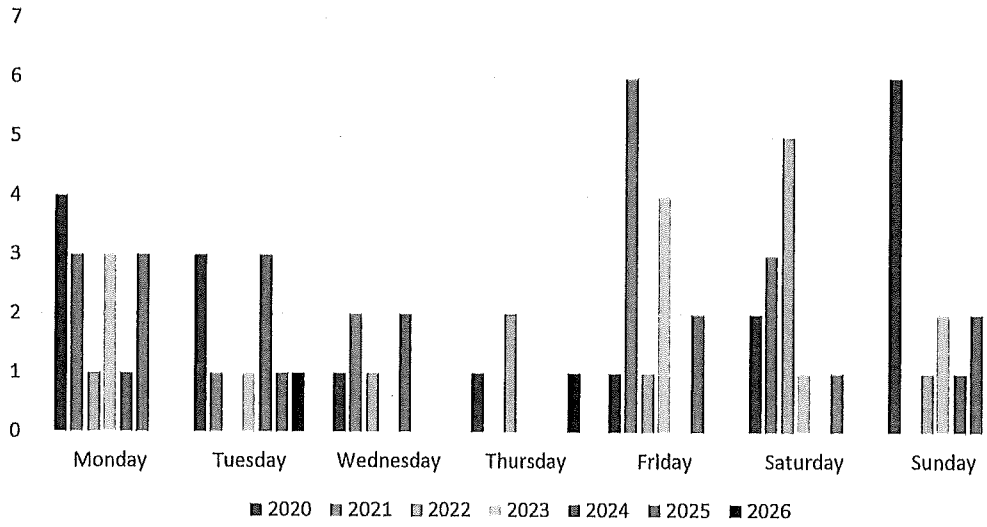
Calls Being Investigated When Use Of Force Was Necessary



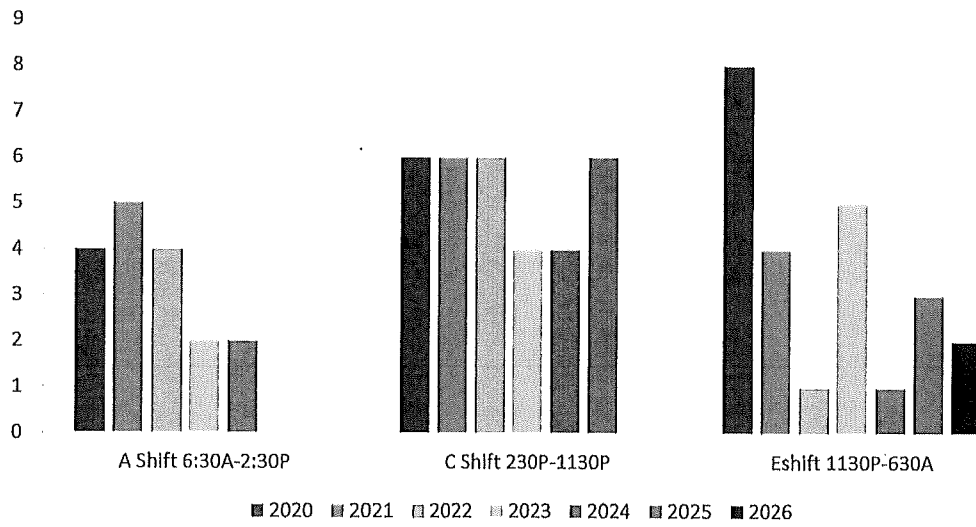
Drug or Alcohol Involved



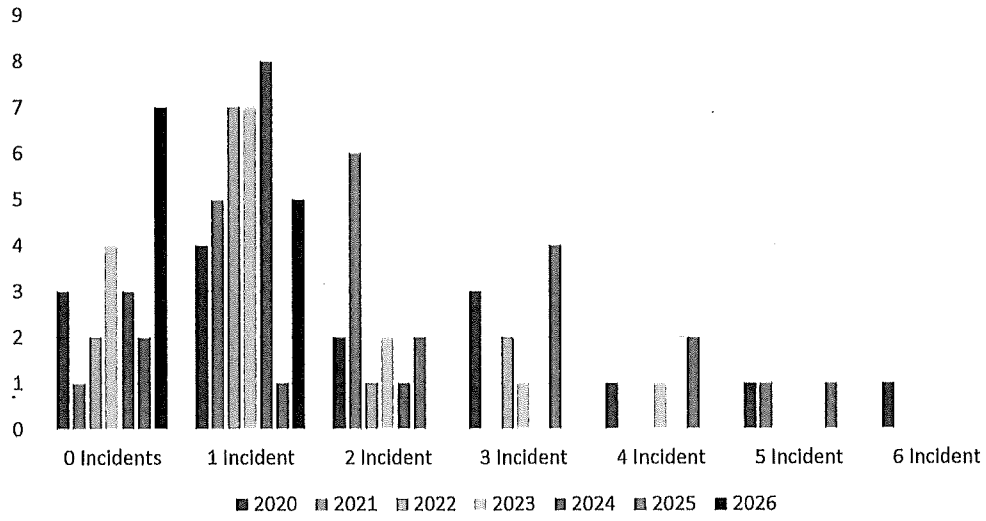

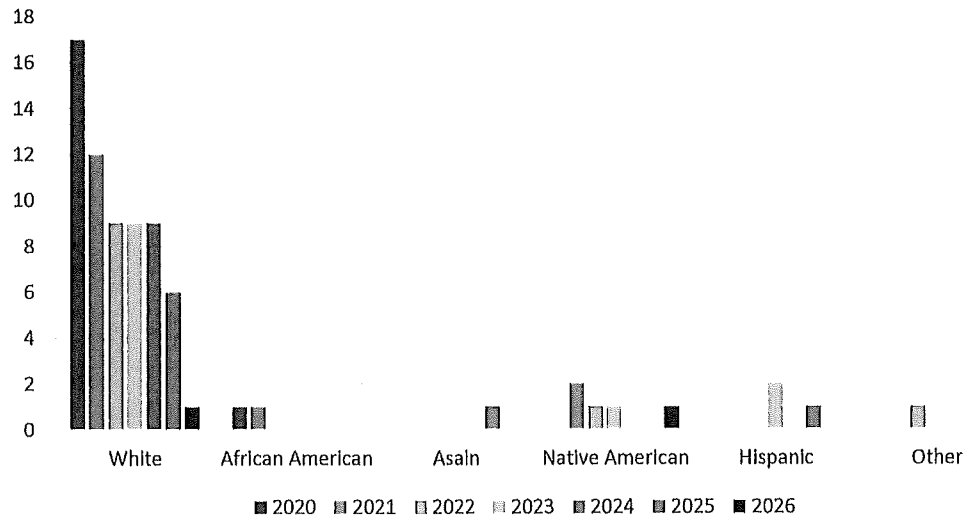
Use of Force By Shift



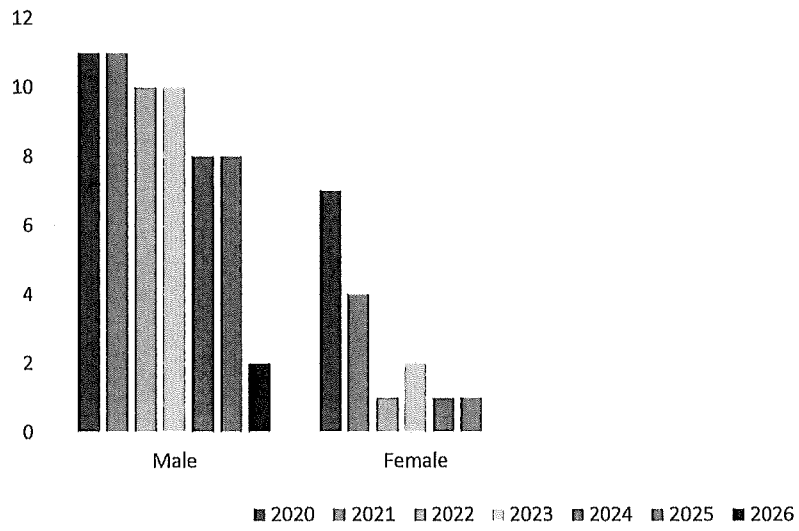

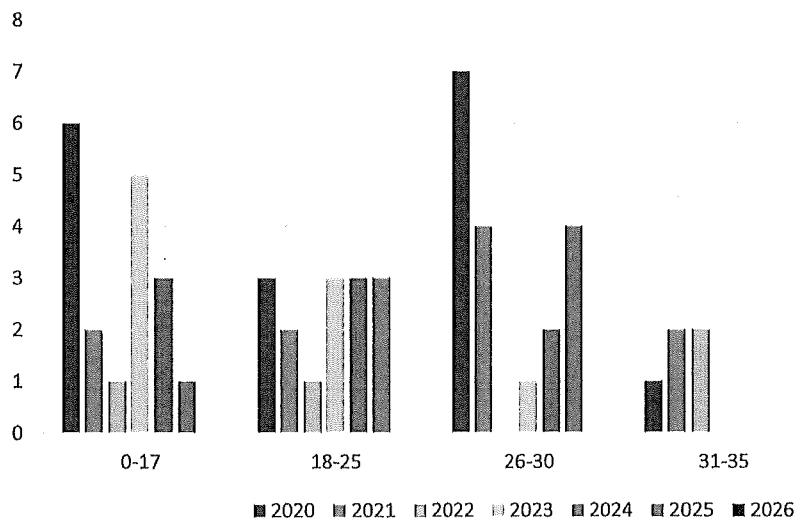
